4. LOCAL CONSERVATION CORPS: LOCAL CONSERVATION CORPS CALRECYCLE RCL 40 GRANT

Shawn Riggins, Local Conservation Corps Director, provided an overview of the CalRecycle RCL 40 grant application in the amount of \$2,282,789, to begin from July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2027. This funding will support 30 corps staff.



Commissioner Jenkins-McGill asked if Corpsmembers get paid for participating in the Local Conservation Corps CalRecycle grant. Riggins stated yes, corpsmembers get paid to participate in the program and receive education training, and several industry-recognized credentials.

6. WOMEN, INFANTS & CHILDREN: WIC FUNDING AWARD

This funding will ensure that low-income families in Fresno County continue to have access to essential supplemental nutrition.

SANCTUARY AND SUPPORT SERVICES: FRESNO COUNTY HUMAN TRAFFICKING SUPPORT SERVICES GRANT

Gattie-Blanco, provided an overview of the Human Trafficking Support Services grant application submitted to the County of Fresno in the amount of \$1,250,000, for a five-year project period. Gattie-Blanco stated that if funded, the funds will support over 2,100 survivors of human trafficking, including more than 500 minors.

Turner stated that the monitoring report found that three of eight files submitted and reviewed by the FRWDB monitoring department did not have sufficient documentation, resulting in repayment of unbillable costs to the FRWDB in the amount of \$5,830.19.

<u>Turner continued by stating that, in response to the programmatic monitoring findings and eligibility issues, program managers have been retraining and implementing measures to ensure component compliance.</u>

Recommended Action

Interim Chief Executive Officer recommends Committee approval for full Board consideration of the California Violence Intervention and Prevention Grant Program (CalVIP) grant application to the California Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) in the amount of \$4,537,703 over a three-year period from January 1, 2026, to December 31, 2028.

Background

Formerly known as the California Gang Reduction, Intervention & Prevention (CalGRIP) Grant Program, the State Legislature established the California Violence Intervention and Prevention (CalVIP) Grant Program in Fiscal Year (FY) 2017-18. The BSCC has administered four rounds of CalVIP funding, providing more than \$250 million toward local violence intervention and prevention efforts. Eligible applicants for CalVIP Cohort 5 funding are community-based organizations, cities, counties and tribes that are disproportionately impacted by community gun violence.

Advance Peace aims to implement a Large Community Based Organization (CBO) Scope Project for Cohort 5 by expanding our current services beyond the City of Fresno to encompass all of Fresno County.

Our goal is to transform lives and build healthier, safer, and more equitable communities by addressing and ultimately ending the cycle of retaliatory gun violence in urban neighborhoods and beyond.

If awarded, the program will need to submit a Governing Board Resolution. The grant application is due on August 18, 2025. An informational item was presented to the Committee on March 12, 2025.

Recommended Action

Interim Chief Executive Officer recommends Committee approval for full Board consideration to enter into a contract agreement with CalViva/Health Net, Anthem Blue Cross and Kaiser Permanente for the Housing and Homelessness Incentive Program (HHIP) in the amount of \$305,948 over a 24-month project period from July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2027.

Background

This item was originally presented and approved during the April 16, 2025, Program Planning & Evaluation Committee Meeting and approved at the April 21, 2025, Board of Commissioners Meeting. The item is being reintroduced to reflect contract agreement revisions.

HHIP is an incentive program that aims to improve health outcomes and access to whole care services by addressing housing insecurity and instability as a social determinant of health for Medi-Cal members. The goals of HHIP are to:

- 1. Reduce and prevent homelessness; and,
- 2. Ensure that Medi-Cal Managed Care Plans (MCPs) develop the necessary capacity and partnerships to connect their members to needed housing services.

As a long-standing member of the Fresno Madera Continuum of Care (FMCoC) and primary youth serving provider, Fresno EOC will use these funds to support one Lived Experience Liaison to work directly with Lived Experience experts and develop and assist with a Youth Action Board. Funds will also be used to directly support the experts and youth with stipends.

Fiscal Impact

This funding will support personnel and stipends for Lived Experience experts. Cal Viva/Health Net will fund \$206,809; Anthem Blue Cross will fund \$95,525 and Kaiser Permanente will fund \$3.614.

The Anthem Blue Cross and Kaiser Permanente contracts are currently pending. They have been incorporated into the following budget, as all Managed Care Plans (MCPs) funding is accounted for



within the budgets of the CalViva/Health Net contract. Funding levels are based on MCP CalAIM enrollment in Fresno and Madera Counties.

Interim Chief Executive Officer recommends Committee ratification for full Board consideration of the Chick-fil-A True Inspiration Awards Grant Program to Chick-fil-A in the amount of \$200,000 for a one-year project period from January 1, 2026, to December 31, 2026.

Background

The Chick-fil-A True Inspiration Awards is an annual grant program that supports nonprofit organizations in the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom, and Singapore across five categories: Caring for People, Caring through Food, Caring for Communities and Caring for our Planet, which supports organizations nominated by local Chick-fil-A Operators. The program recognizes organizations that align with Chick-fil-A's corporate social responsibility mission to uplift youth and underserved communities.

Food Services applied under the "Caring through Food" category for initiatives aimed at combating hunger and food insecurity among children and their families. The funding will enhance the Free and Healthy Meals for Kids program by replacing the non-operational green Mobile Food Bus. This will help maintain food access for rural and urban children during school breaks.

The grant application was submitted on May 1, 2025. An informational item was presented to the Committee on April 16, 2025.

Fiscal Impact

This funding will be used to purchase a new Mobile Food Bus, replacing the currently nonoperational green bus used for the Food Services Meals for Kids program. No match is required.

The Fresno EOC LGBTQ+ Resource Center will offer weekly peer-led groups for 2S/LGBTQ+ youth (11-25) on topics like self-acceptance, harm reduction, mental health, healthy relationships, sexual health, advocacy, and career planning. It will provide in-person and virtual resource navigation for essential needs such as housing, food, and legal aid in urban and rural Fresno County, serving 250 youth with trans-specific and bilingual support. Additionally, a multilingual social media campaign will promote awareness, outreach, and community engagement among 2S/LGBTQ+ youth.

Interim Chief Executive Officer recommends Committee ratification for full Board consideration of the Fresno Regional Workforce Development Board (FRWDB) High Road Construction Careers Subaward Agreement with the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office in the amount of \$139,850 for a six-month project period from April 4, 2025, to September 30, 2026.

Background

The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office is providing funding to support ValleyBuild's three cohorts, aiming to showcase the essential role of paid, hands-on work experience, a component currently lacking within the Community College system. Through a strategic partnership with the FRWDB Multi-Craft Core Curriculum, which incorporates Valley Apprenticeship Connections (VAC) as both the initial and final phases and leveraging Fresno EOC's capacity to serve as the employer of record, the College will demonstrate a comprehensive approach that connects real-world training directly to employment opportunities.

VAC will provide hands-on work experience and act as the employer of record for Cohorts 43, 44, and 45.

Fiscal Impact

This funding will support personnel, facilities cost, mileage and administration cost. No match is required.

Recommended Action

The information presented below is intended to keep the Board apprised on the contract selection for security services at the Local Conservation Corps (LCC) facility.

Background

Due to increasing costs and a strategic effort to reduce expenditures, a Request for Proposal (RFP) for security services was issued on December 9, 2024, and closed on December 20, 2024. Notices were posted on the agency's website, LCC's Facebook page, and invitations were extended to multiple security firms. The results of the bid proposals were shared with the Facilities Director, Procurement Director, and Program Officer by the LCC Director. Based on this review, CIS was identified as the lowest bidder.

Effective January 1, 2025, LCC contracted with CIS for security services for a two-year contract period, this was processed through an amendment via Fresno EOC's executive security contract.

Fiscal Impact

A combination of the CalRecycle, Department of Labor Youth Build (DOL YouthBuild) grant and CSBG funding helped cover the cost from January through April 2025. There will be no reduction in the annual cost of \$200,000.

Continuing services with CIS remains the most favorable choice at this time.
